


# **AWRA Winter Newsletter: UW Student Chapter**

#### **Autumn 2005:**

We had an excellent turnout at the kick-off meeting during the first week of classes. Those that attended the meeting came up with a great list of ideas for future AWRA activities. #### **Restoration Event:**

On November 5th, about twenty University of Washington students braved the cold and rain to help People for Puget Sound restore a site along the Duwamish River. Alison Prior, a student from Australia who was in Seattle for the National AWRA Conference, joined us for the restoration event. People for Puget Sound are involved with a number of restoration sites along the Duwamish.

(restoration event continued) Although this area is heavily industrialized, the Duwamish provides important fish passage for salmon migrating into the Cedar Watershed. The particular site that we worked to improve was Terminal 105, an artificial side channel that provides estuarine wetland habitat. We planted native trees and shrubs to help recover the riparian area. This improvement will help salmon that utilize this habitat when they rest and acclimate during their migration between saltwater and freshwater environments. Students also attended a Career Night, where a panel of water resource professionals from government, academic, non-profit, and private sector jobs discussed water-related career options.

AWRA Summer Specialty Conference Adaptive Management of Water Resources Missoula, Montana - June 26 - 28, 2006 (Call for Abstracts Deadline: January 20, 2006)

There will be exploration of critical issues in adaptive management, working towards developing consensus on the key terms and the concepts, and discussion of the critical "parts" (e.g., science, monitoring, management, policy, legal, public involvement, socioeconomics, information management and funding) necessary to implement successful scientifically-based adaptive-management projects or programs. There will also be exploration of practical, "real world" lessons-learned on such topics as the role adaptive management in conflict resolution and the use of regulatory and voluntary, nonregulatory management approaches, such as wetland banking, endangered species habitat conservation, water quality credit trading, and other forms of market-based environmental stewardship.

FULL TIME STUDENTS receive a substantial discount on registration fees – see above. The Early Bird Registration Full Conference Fee (if received by **May 31, 2006**) is \$390 for AWRA members and \$490 for non-members. Preregistration is required! One-day registrations are also offered. **No refunds will be given after the May 31, 2006.**
