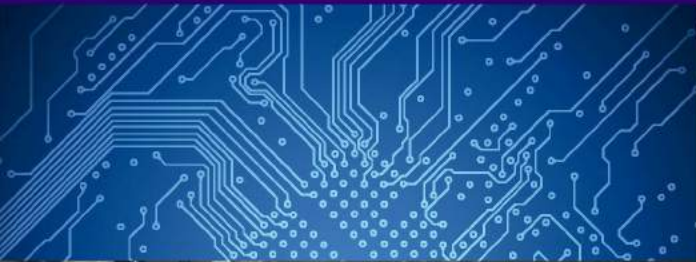

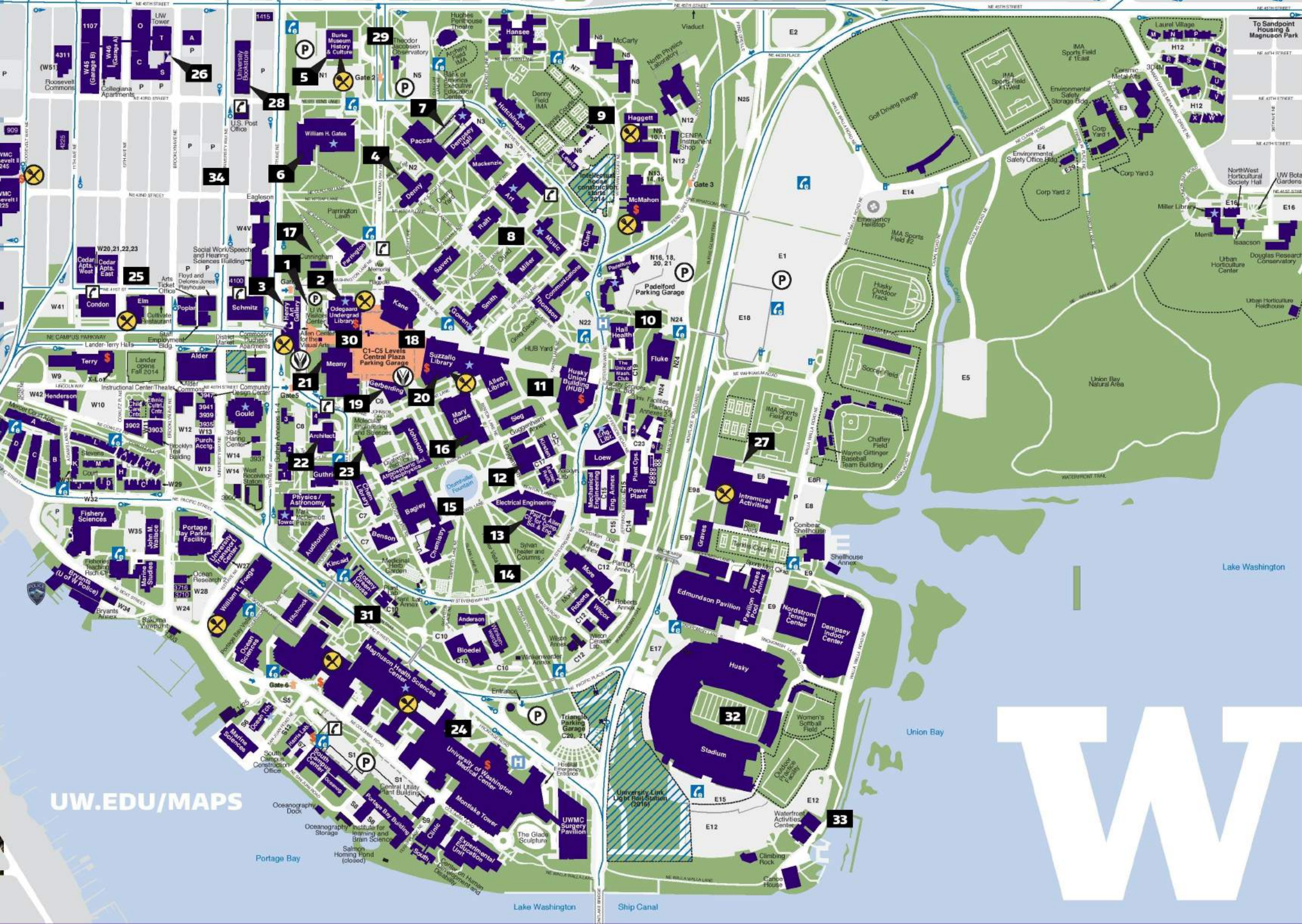

POINTS OF INTEREST

1 Information and Visitors Center

The Visitors Center is located next to the George Washington Statue, on the ground floor of the Odegaard Library.

2 Odegaard Library

This library contains the Learning Commons, collections, collaborative spaces, computing, research and writing services, and food at the By George cafe.

3 Henry Art Gallery

This contemporary art center features innovative programming, public education, diverse film and lecture series and exhibitions.

4 Denny Hall

Built in 1895, Denny Hall is the oldest building on campus, with a copper clad belfry that contains the Varsity Bell, brought around Cape Horn for the original campus in downtown Seattle. The bell is ceremonially rung at Homecoming every year.

5 The Burke Museum of Natural History and Culture

Founded in 1885, the Burke Museum is the premier museum of natural history and culture in the Pacific Northwest.

6 William H. Gates Law School

The 196,000-square-foot, six-story building is named after William H. Gates Sr., a 1950 graduate of the UW School of Law and father of the Microsoft co-founder. This building also houses the Gallagher Law Library, which has the largest collection of law publications in the Northwest.

7 Foster School of Business

Named after Michael G. Foster, founder of the investment firm Foster & Marshall, the business school is home to PACCAR Hall, the new Dempsey Hall and Mackenzie Hall.

8 The Liberal Arts Quadrangle (the Quad)

Featuring gothic architecture, brick pathways and green lawns, the Quad is surrounded by buildings that house the arts, humanities and social sciences. It is the primary gathering place on campus, especially when the Yoshino cherry trees are in bloom each spring.

9 North Campus Residence Halls

Four residence halls for undergraduates are located in this area of campus, offering a variety of living arrangements.

10 Hall Health Primary Care Center

The health care center for students provides services through its travel, women's and immunization clinics.

11 Husky Union Building (HUB)

The HUB's spaces are designed by students, for students. It's all here, from study and meeting rooms to ballrooms, billiards, bowling, coffee and restaurants.

12 Guggenheim Hall/ Kirsten Wind Tunnel

Envisioned as a building that would "assist in making air transportation safe, popular and regularly available," Guggenheim Hall houses the Department of Aeronautics & Astronautics. The wind tunnel is famous for testing the Space Needle, airplanes, and countless academic and commercial designs.

13 Paul G. Allen Center for Computer Science & Engineering

Named after the co-founder of Microsoft, this building has two wings, combining electrical engineering with computer science and engineering. The central atrium soars six stories high and features informal team brainstorming areas on every level.

14 Rainier Vista, Sylvan Theater and Columns

With its inspiring view of Mount Rainier and Drumheller fountain, this area was the site of the 1909 Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition. See the original 1861 Territorial University's columns in Sylvan Grove Theater just off Stevens Way.

15 Drumheller Fountain

The centerpiece of Rainier Vista, the multi-stream fountain is at the center of Frosh Pond, named for an early tradition of dunking freshmen. It was also used for log-rolling contests.

16 Mary Gates Hall

This building combines the original physics building from 1928 with a modern atrium, wired classrooms and laboratories. It houses undergraduate education services and the Career Center. The building is named for Bill Gates III's mother, Mary Maxwell Gates, '50, who served on the UW Board of Regents for 18 years and was a strong advocate for undergraduate education.

17 Cunningham Hall/UW Women's Center

Built for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in 1909 as the Women's Building, it was an important gathering place for suffragists who fought for women's right to vote. Today it continues to serve as a lifelong learning place for all. The building is named for renowned photographer and 1907 alumna Imogene Cunningham.

18 Central Plaza (Red Square)

Known around campus as Red Square, this large red brick plaza is one of the central gathering places on campus, connecting the performing arts at Meany Hall with Odegaard and Suzzallo libraries, the Henry Art Gallery and the lecture rooms in Kane Hall.

19 Gerberding Hall

This building is home to the Office of the President and other administrative offices.

20 Suzzallo Library

A classic example of American collegiate gothic architecture, the library is renowned for its circular grand staircase and its expansive Reading Room. With its 65-foot-high ceilings, its rows of brass-lamped oak study tables and its permeating silence, the Reading Room is often called the "Harry Potter room."

21 Meany Hall

The UW's premier performing arts venue, and home of the UW Dance Department, Meany Hall has seating for 1,200 in the main theater and a smaller performance hall that seats 300.

22 Architecture Hall

Built in 1907 as the art museum for the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, Architecture Hall now contains studios for the construction management and architecture departments.

23 Molecular Engineering and Sciences Building

This building is home to the Molecular Engineering & Sciences Institute, the Institute for Protein Design, the Clean Energy Institute and the NanoTech User Facility, and features state-of-the-art labs, innovative common spaces and cutting-edge green features.

24 UW Medical Center

One of the highest-ranked medical centers in America, UW Medical Center is home to the UW School of Medicine, which also routinely ranks among the country's top medical schools.

25 West Campus Residence Halls

Student housing located west of 15th Ave. NE includes new, environmentally friendly buildings and offers eclectic dining options, parking and convenient access to public transportation.

26 UW Tower Complex

This 22-story tower and adjacent buildings are home to UW administrative offices, UW Press and UW Professional and Continuing Education.

27 Intramural Activities Building (IMA)

A state-of-the-art fitness center, the IMA features everything from a climbing wall to cardio and weight-training machines, gyms and a pool.

28 University Book Store

The University Book Store opened in 1900 in a cloak room next to the UW President's Office in Denny Hall. It is now located on the Ave at NE 43rd St., with additional locations in the HUB and the South Campus Center, downtown Seattle, Bellevue, Tacoma, Bothell, Mill Creek and Renton.

29 Bronze "W"

A 7-foot-tall bronze "W" greets students and visitors at the intersection of Memorial Way and NE 45th St. Funded by the class of 1960, it was erected 50 years after the class's graduation.

30 George Washington statue

Standing proudly next to Odegaard Library at the entrance to Red Square, the George Washington Statue was dedicated during the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition of 1909.

31 The Burke-Gilman Trail

Originally part of the Burlington Northern Railroad, the trail borders campus and the neighborhood on the south and east, and is a great way to get just about anywhere by bike or foot.

32 Husky Stadium

Cheer on the Dawgs with over 70,000 other fans at the recently renovated Husky Stadium. Overlooking Lake Washington and boasting views of downtown Seattle and mountains to the east and west, the venue is annually voted the most scenic football structure in the nation.

33 Waterfront Activities Center (WAC)

Located directly behind Husky Stadium on Union Bay and Montlake Cut, the WAC offers canoe and rowboat rentals, giving visitors the opportunity to explore Lake Washington and the wetlands by paddle.

34 U District

Located in the heart of Seattle, the UW is part of this vibrant urban neighborhood. University Way, known as "the Ave" is at the center. Ethnic foods, bike shops and specialty stores, and the local drugstore and supermarket are an easy walk from campus. There's a farmers market on Saturdays year-round, and movie theaters with both mainstream and independent films.
